"Lord I Call..." Tone 6

Lord, I call upon You, <u>hear</u> me! <u>Hear</u> me, O Lord! Lord, I call upon You, <u>hear</u> me! Receive the <u>voice</u> of my prayer, when I <u>cal</u>l upon You!// Hear <u>me</u>, O Lord!

Let my <u>prayer</u> arise in Your sight as <u>in</u>cense, and let the lifting <u>up</u> of my hands be an evening <u>sac</u>rifice!// Hear <u>me</u>, O Lord!

V. (6) If You, O Lord, should mark iniquities, Lord, who could stand? But there is forgiveness with You.

Tone 6^{*} (from the Lenten Triodion, by Emperor Leo)

Wishing to see the tomb of <u>Laz</u>arus, O Lord, since of Your own will, You were soon to <u>dwell</u> in a tomb, You asked: "Where have You <u>laid</u> him?" Learning that which was already <u>known</u> to You, You cried to Your beloved friend: "<u>Laz</u>arus, come forth!" and he who had no breath obeyed the Lord Who <u>gave</u> him breath,// for You are the Savior of our souls.

V. (5) For Your Name's sake I wait for You, O Lord. My soul has waited for Your word; my soul has hoped on the Lord.

V. **(4)** *From the morning watch until night, from the morning watch, let Israel hope on the Lord!*

You have come to the place of the burial of <u>Laz</u>arus, O Lord, the tomb of a man <u>four</u> days dead. Weeping for Your friend, O Bread of Life, You <u>raised</u> him up. Therefore death was <u>bound</u> by Your voice, and grave clothes were <u>loos</u>ened by Your hand. The band of disciples was <u>filled</u> with joy. One song of adoration was <u>sung</u> by all:// "Blessed are You, O Savior! Have <u>mer</u>cy on us!"

V. (3) For with the Lord there is mercy and with Him is plenteous redemption, and He will deliver Israel from all his iniquities.

Your voice destroyed the kingdom of <u>hell</u>, O Lord. Your powerful word raised from the tomb the one who was <u>four</u> days dead. Lazarus became the saving first-fruits of the world's regene<u>ra</u>tion. All things are possible for You, O Lord and <u>King</u> of all.// Grant Your servants cleansing and great <u>mer</u>cy!

V. (2) Praise the Lord, all nations! Praise Him, all peoples!

You came to the tomb of <u>Laz</u>arus, O Lord, and <u>called</u> him by name, wishing to assure Your disciples of Your own Resur<u>rec</u>tion. Hell was <u>van</u>quished! It released Lazarus who was <u>four</u> days dead. He cried <u>out to You://</u> "Glory to You, O <u>bless</u>ed Lord!"

V. **(1)** For His mercy is confirmed on us, and the truth of the Lord endures *forever*.

You came to Bethany to wake <u>Laz</u>arus, O Lord, accompanied by Your dis<u>ciples</u>. You <u>wept</u> for him, but he was raised by Your almighty <u>pow</u>er. A man four days dead cried to You, O our <u>Sav</u>ior:// "Glory to You, O <u>bless</u>ed Lord!"

> Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 8 (from the Lenten Triodion, by Andrew the Blind)

We have com<u>plet</u>ed the forty days that <u>prof</u>it our souls. Let us sing: "Rejoice, city of Bethany, home of <u>Laz</u>arus! Rejoice, Mary and <u>Martha</u>, his <u>sis</u>ters! Tomorrow Christ will come and raise your dead <u>broth</u>er to life. Bitter and unsatisfied, hell will <u>hear</u> His voice. Shaking and groaning, it will re<u>lease</u> bound <u>Laz</u>arus. The assembly of Hebrews will <u>be</u> amazed. They will greet Him with palms and <u>branch</u>es. Though their priests and elders look on Him with <u>envy</u> and <u>mal</u>ice, the children shall <u>praise</u> Him in song: 'Blessed is He Who comes in the <u>Name</u> of the Lord,// the King of <u>Is</u>rael!'''

Now let us beg the <u>Lov</u>er of man: enable us to see the Holy <u>Week</u> of Your <u>Pas</u>sion, that we may glorify Your <u>mighty</u> work, Your wonderful plan for our sal<u>va</u>tion, as we <u>sing</u> with one <u>heart</u> and voice:// "O Lord, <u>glo</u>ry to You!"

V. To Thee I lift up mine eyes, O Thou Who art enthroned in the heavens! Behold, as the eyes of servants look to the hand of their master, as the eyes of a maid to the hand of her mistress, so our eyes look to the Lord our God, till He have mercy upon us. (*Ps* 122:1-2)
